IOM BANGLADESH: ROHINGYA HUMANITARIAN CRISIS RESPONSE

MONTHLY SITUATION REPORT



SIX YEARS ON, ROHINGYAS NEED INCREASED SUPPORT













As the crisis enters its seventh year, nearly a million Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh are trapped in a cycle of uncertainty and insecurity. IOM urges the international community to provide Rohingya refugees and host communities with humanitarian assistance and long-term support. On 25 August 2017, hundreds of thousands fled Rakhine, Myanmar, to Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh. Cox's Bazar has become the world's biggest refugee camp, with about one million refugees, half of whom are children. This year, humanitarian agencies have requested USD 876 million to help 1.47 million Rohingya refugees and local communities. However, the funds raised for this joint Response Plan had only reached nearly 29 per cent of the target as of mid-year. This shortfall underscores the urgent need for unwavering and consistent financial support to the refugees, who almost entirely rely on humanitarian assistance. The crucial funding that sustains the hopes and aspirations of these refugees is dwindling, casting a shadow of uncertainty over their future. There is an increasing need to empower Rohingya refugees through improved access to education, skill development, and livelihood opportunities, which are vital components of this effort. There is a significant dependence on humanitarian assistance for basic needs arising from limited opportunities. Despite the shortfall in funding and other challenges, IOM and its humanitarian partners, in close coordination with the Government of Bangladesh, continue to deliver life-saving aid and essential services to refugees and host communities.
