# IOM BANGLADESH INTENSIFIES EFFORTS TO COMBAT GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE IN COX'S BAZAR



As the world observes the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence (GBV), taking place from 25 November to 10 December, IOM Bangladesh reaffirms its commitment to step up efforts against GBV in both Rohingya and Bangladeshi host communities.

At present, nearly one million Rohingya refugees are living in congested displacement camps; 52 per cent are women and girls. Tackling GBV has become increasingly more complex against a backdrop of a deteriorating protection environment for Rohingya refugees overall. Difficult living conditions within camps, restricted livelihood and educational opportunities, limited resources including food rations, and a lack of freedom of movement - particularly for women and girls - have created conditions that exacerbate the risks for GBV, including those related to intimate partner violence, child marriage, and human trafficking. Individuals with diverse gender expressions and identities and sexual orientations are also at higher risk from GBV in these camps.

IOM's longstanding commitment to responding to gender-based violence is reflected in its specialized GBV programming, which focuses on risk mitigation, survivor support, and addressing root causes. Our nine Women and Girls Safe Spaces (WGSS) play a crucial role, offering counseling, psychosocial support, education, and life skills in a survivor-centered environment. In 2022, IOM published the <u>Establishing Women and Girls Safe Spaces in the Rohingya Refugee Response: a Guidance Note and Best Practice from Cox's Bazar</u> to share best practices and ensure shared learning for similar initiatives.

IOM Bangladesh prioritizes interventions which address the root causes of gender-based violence. Recognizing that gender inequality and unequal power relations needs to be addressed at all levels, IOM implements the Engaging Men Through Accountable Practice (EMAP) programme. EMAP is an innovative evidence-based primary prevention model for engaging men and support transformative individual behavior change.

In the face of persistent gender-based violence, IOM Bangladesh remains unwavering in its commitment to fostering a safer environment for both Rohingya refugees and the Bangladeshi individuals in host communities. Together, let's invest in a future free from gender-based violence, echoing the global theme of "UNiTE! Invest to Prevent Violence against Women and Girls."
