BUILDING RESILIENCE OF RETURNING MIGRANTS: ECONOMIC REINTEGRATION AND COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

The Andaman Sea Crisis has brought to light the ongoing tragedy of thousands of Bangladeshi and Myanmar nationals trying to migrate via irregular channels mainly towards Malaysia and falling into the hands of people smugglers or traffickers. With 1,025 Bangladeshis returned to Bangladesh as of 12 July 2015 and many more to come, it is clear that the motivation to migrate outweighs the perceived danger of the trip and the uncertainty of success at destination. The project aims to raise awareness around safe migration amongst returnees and target communities and support them with income, livelihood and employment opportunities.

This project aims to provide individual assistance to at least 100 returnees, including women, for skills development and reintegration in the community and create opportunity for the potentials for remigration; provision of community infrastructure in 8 communities to strengthen economic reintegration of the returning migrants and livelihood conditions in the communities; increase awareness and understanding of Safe Migration Information and create accountability of local authority and civil society in five project locations for 3600 returning migrants, family members and target community members.
